Over the course of the coming year, I will continue to advocate strongly that the voices of children and young people are listened to during the implementation of the recommendations arising from the *Commission of Inquiry into the Tasmanian Government's Responses to Child Sexual Abuse in Institutional Settings,* including in relation to the establishment of a more effective Commission for Children and Young People model.

Due to the caretaker conventions prevailing at the time of this correspondence and the development of the Annual Plan 2024-2025, I have taken the liberty to provide the Hon Rebecca White MP and Rosalie Woodruff MP with a copy of the same.

I would welcome the opportunity to discuss my Annual Plan 2024-2025 with you in due course.

# Commissioner for Children and Young People 2024-2025 Annual Plan

The office of Commissioner for Children and Young People is established under the *Commissioner for Children and Young People Act 2016* (CCYP Act). The Commissioner's functions, which are set out in section 8 of the CCYP Act, include:

- (a) advocating for all children and young people in the State generally;
- (b) acting as an advocate for a detainee under the Youth Justice Act 1997;
- (c) researching, investigating and influencing policy development into matters relating to children and young people generally;
- (d) promoting, monitoring and reviewing the wellbeing of children and young people generally;
- (e) promoting and empowering the participation of children and young people in the making of decisions, or the expressing of opinions on matters, that may affect their lives;
- (f) assisting in ensuring the State satisfies its national and international obligations in respect of children and young people generally;
- (g) encouraging and promoting the establishment by organisations or appropriate and accessible mechanisms for the participation of children and young people in matters that may affect them.

Unless otherwise specified, when performing a function or exercising a power under the CCYP Act or any other Act, the Commissioner is required to act independently, impartially and in the public interest.

In performing these functions or exercising a power under the CCYP Act, the Commissioner is required to:

- do so according to the principle that the wellbeing and best interests of children and young people are paramount; and
- observe any relevant provisions of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child.

Section 7 of the CCYP Act requires that no later than 31 March in each year, the Commissioner for Children and Young People is to prepare an annual plan describing the Commissioner's proposed program of work and activities for the following financial year and provide a copy of that plan to the Minister.

In 2023, the Commission of Inquiry into the Tasmanian Government's responses to Child Sexual Abuse in Institutional Settings recommended a new and distinct Commission for Children and Young People be established and suggested that this should occur by 1 July 2024. Until this change occurs, and while the CCYP Act remains in force, Commissioner McLean will perform her statutory duties in the public interest and in the best interests of Tasmania's children and young people.

The Commissioner's priority remains ensuring the voices of Tasmania's children and young people are heard. In 2024, the Commissioner will advocate strongly that their voices are listened to during the implementation of the Commission of Inquiry's recommendations.

The Commissioner has long championed the establishment of a more effective Commission for Children and Young People model recommended by the Commission of Inquiry. The Commissioner, and her staff, will work constructively with all stakeholders to transition to this model.

The table below sets out streams of activity to be undertaken in 2024-2025 that align to the strategic priority areas of the Commissioner's Strategic Framework for 2022 and 2023. Given the levels of change anticipated in coming months, the Commissioner is extending her current Strategic Framework into 2024.

This includes monitoring the implementation of recommendations arising from the Commissioner's Own Motion Systemic Inquiry: A Place at The Table – an investigation into a change to the case management of children and young people in care in Tasmania. Note: An Expert Panel has been established to inform this monitoring activity.</li> <li>Monitoring the implementation of legislation that affects or has the capacity to affect the rights and wellbeing of children and young people.</li> <li>Monitoring the development and implementation of Tasmanian Government reform agendas and other initiatives affecting the rights and wellbeing of children and young people, including reforms to the child safety, OOHC and youth justice systems, child and adolescent mental health services, machinery of Government changes, and implementation of recommendations of the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse and the Commission of Inquiry into the Tasmanian Government's Responses to Child Sexual Abuse in Institutional Settings.</li> <li>Where necessary and feasible, investigating and making recommendations in respect of any systemic areas of concern identified through monitoring or communicated to the Commissioner.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Engaging in strategic advocacy and providing advice to promote the rights and wellbeing of children and young people in Tasmania.
